From the Principal

A cautionary tale for Parents.

I once taught a child who came to school very "out of sorts". It was obvious to me that they were not their usual self. They were very uneasy, stuck close to me, followed me around during recess duty and at one loud noise even grabbed my leg.

As the opportunity allowed the child revealed to me that they had watched a scary movie with Mum the night before.

What we allow our children to watch on TV is really important. The Bible puts it this way, "The eye is the lamp of the body. If your eyes are healthy, your whole body will be full of light. But if your eyes are unhealthy, your whole body will be full of darkness. If then the light within you is darkness, how great is that darkness!" (Matthew 6:22-23) Of course this applies to adults as well, but we will focus on children.

Any parent with children of multiple ages understands how hard it can be to find appropriate viewing for all our children. In this we must stand strong and at times differentiate between our children, perhaps allowing some viewing for one but not another. It may be for the sake of the younger we say no to the elder child.

For young children scary images can have a big impact. Images of monsters, nasty animals and horrible faces can stay with a child for a long time. Realistic violence or even just high tension, stressful situations (serious injury, death) can have a huge mental impact.

This impact, as in my example above, can affect a child's behaviour, sleep patterns and general way they relate.

We must also be careful, as a rating of PG etc. does not necessarily guarantee suitability. Sadly, even viewing the news when young children are around must be done cautiously.

Is your child's viewing helping or hindering them?

Stormlight Archives: The Way of Kings

Action, adventure, enormous monsters, mystical weapons, philosophical wonderings, romance, a complex society, almost everything you could ask for in a book you will find in Brandon Sanderson's *The Way of Kings*. The first in a trilogy, this book sets the stage for the best fantasy series I have ever read. The story follows Kaladin, a young soldier turned slave who is attempting to make right his past wrongs. Crippled by insecurity after the death of his brother, Kaladin is sentenced to carry bridges for the army, a death sentence. To escape, he must train his crew, the lowest of the low, into the best fighting force in the entire army, but what can a bridgeman do against the forces of the Parshendi?

The plot also focuses around Shallan, a beautiful but naïve young noble woman who must hide her father's death while attempting to steal a precious artefact from the foremost magician of the land. As she attempts to keep her secrets and her life, palace intrigue surrounds her like sharks, waiting to strike.

This book is a masterpiece, not only due to the gripping plot, but also because of the intricate world that Sanderson creates. This world not only is geographically detailed and beautiful, but has several cultures that are explored in infinitesimal detail. Like a sculptor, Sanderson takes a solid slab of imagination, and chips away at it until we are left with the beautiful *Way of Kings*.

For the first hundred or so pages, I was terribly confused by the details (why were people with light eyes a higher class than the people with brown eyes? Why do the women wear gloves on their left hands?), and then slowly, Sanderson peeled back layers of his society so that I could see the depth and power of his creation. This book mainly focuses around a war, where you

can find archers, and sword-swinging knights galore, but beneath this layer of action lies Sanderson's comments on his own society, on racism in modern day America, and political posturing. Sanderson wraps this quietly thought provoking book in such a thick layer of fun that you have to dig to find it.

This book is an emotional roller-coaster, with the sorrow of Kaladin's past, the angsty indecision of his present, and the Shallan's hysterical one-liners. And it even has pictures!

An incredible book, this would be my number one pick for fantasy, and I would recommend that everyone from year 9 and up head to the library to borrow it, where Mrs McKee has put it in the New Books section.
